A Remembrance

George Johnson

George Johnson, one of the founders of New Hope, died on May 19th while recovering from a cardiac stent procedure. He had celebrated his 86th birthday just three days before his death.

George and his beloved Polly, with the help of Margaret Hullet, made the trek from Long Beach most Saturdays to worship with us. George and Polly were part of a small group of Presbyterian leaders—including Don Oliver and Margaret Hullet -- who conceived New Hope as a New Church Development over a decade ago, and were members of the committee who invited Pastor Chineta to become our Organizing Pastor.

George was a prominent member of our local Presbytery, as he was in the national church. He had been a member of Covenant Presbyterian Church in Long Beach for over 60 years, where he was an Elder and sang in the choir. He served as Moderator of both Los Ranchos Presbytery and of the Synod of Southern California and Hawaii. A civil engineer, George was also a prominent member of SciTech, a group of Presbyterian scientists who, among other things, seek to reconcile the often disparate subjects of science and faith. He received SciTech's most prestigious award in 2005.

George was born in Albuquerque, New Mexico on May 16, 1930. He graduated from the University of New Mexico in 1947 with a degree in Civil Engineering. He enlisted in the Air National Guard and was stationed in Long Beach briefly in 1951. He moved to California permanently in 1953, and married Polly Harnett in 1953. George worked for the City of Long Beach for 25 years, retired, and then worked as a Consultant for a prominent local engineering firm for 26 years before retiring again. He performed the engineering work on numerous important public works



projects in Long Beach, including the Long Beach Marina, the Long Beach Aquarium, and the bike path which fronts nearly the entirety of Long Beach ocean front.

"George's work was very important to him," observed Polly, "as was his work in the community. George's gentle character, and ability to truly listen to others, permitted him to harmonize the most contentious opposing points of view in almost any setting."

George and Polly have long been involved in helping to mediate issues of racial tension in Long Beach, and were often the only Caucasian residents invited into meetings during times of racial conflict or turmoil. George worked on the Poly Community Interracial Committee, and he and Polly were available day and night to be called upon for their counsel.

In addition to Polly, George is survived by two adult children, four grandchildren, and four great grandchildren. His son, Brian, followed his father into civil engineering, and lives with his wife Gretchen and their two children in Santa Fe, New Mexico. His daughter, Martha, lives in Lemon Grove with her husband, Chris -- who Pastors a church in San Diego -- and their two children.

Profiles In Courage

Bill Brooks -Against The Odds

Bill Brooks, who, along with his wife of 44 years, Audrey, was one of the charter members of New Hope, has lived a life full of faith, work, and family — a foundation that has served him well as he battled lung cancer. Bill was recently interviewed by the Gazette.

New Hope Gazette: When was your lung cancer diagnosed, and what is the current status of the disease?

Bill Brooks: The diagnosis was made a little over a year ago. And, after a pretty long year, I am now cancer free!

NHG: Praise God! How do you account for your success in dealing with the disease?

BB: Good doctors, taking radiation and chemotherapy at the same time, and an abiding trust that God is with me, no matter what happens. That's a defense that's hard for any disease to get through.

NHG: And then there's Audrey?

BB: And thank God for her. She has always been my rock, and she's been with me nonstop through this fight. I didn't think it was possible to feel closer to her, but her support and determination through this disease has made us even closer than we were before.

NHG: You make it sound like battling this disease has been a positive experience?

BB: I suppose in a way it has been. My faith has deepened, as have my relationships. But look, we're all going to die of something. Honestly, I don't think about death much, any more than I think about being 89 years old. I guess, in a way, I take these things for granted: getting old, and dying, are part of life. It's nothing to be afraid of.

NHG: Have church, and faith, always been a part of your life?



BB: Yes, they have. I was raised in the Baptist Church in Washington D.C. My grandfather was a Baptist Pastor, and church was at the center of my life growing up. It stuck.

NHG: You taught 4th through 6th grade for 30 years before you became an administrator, and you and Audrey raised three children together. What advice can you give our young people about protecting their health?

BB: It's pretty simple: don't put things into your body today that you know will hurt you later. Because 'later' gets here sooner than you think. I smoked for almost 40 years when I was younger, and it eventually caught up with me. There is always a price to pay for unhealthy behavior. Don't think there isn't.

NHG: You met Pastor Chineta at Knox Presbyterian Church in Los Angeles, where you had been an elder for 25 years -- and you and Audrey were among the first members of New Hope. What drew you to this new church development?

BB: Both Audrey and I felt strongly that Chineta, and Reggie, were the right people to plant and build a new church in Orange County. We wanted to help them, and to be a part of building something important.

NHG: Good call.

BB: It was, wasn't it.

Anita Ford — Woman of the Year

While Anita Ford's husband, C.J., has always thought of his wife of 28 years as his own personal 'woman of the year', Anita's standing to make that claim was recently made official by Assemblyman Tom Daly, D-69th. Mr. Daly singled out Anita as one of only five women in his district to be tabbed "Woman of the Year", in recognition of her work as Chairman of the Orange County Heritage Museum, and her decades of service as an educator of our youth.

Anita, the mother of three wonderful adult children, received the award at an outdoor festival held at Jefferson Elementary School in Santa Ana, where she has served as principal for 17 years. While Anita knew of the award, she was unaware until she actually received the award that it came

with a \$5,000 check to be used for her school. To say that she was ecstatic would be an understatement.

"\$5,000 is a huge sum of money for my school," beamed Anita, "and we will use it to buy additional books for our library. We have needed books in Spanish for a long time, so these funds are sorely needed."

Jefferson's student body is almost 90% Hispanic or Latino, and provides its students with a Spanish Dual Immersion course of study – so books written in Spanish are essential to the curriculum. Anita is fluent in Spanish, and her "Woman of the Year" acceptance speech was laced with Spanish, a product of Anita's earlier work as a Spanish Bilingual Teacher before she became an administrator.

"Spanish is a beautiful and musical language," says Anita," and I'm privileged to be able to converse in it every day with my students, faculty, and staff."

Anita is a graduate of Sunny Hills High School, graduated from California State University, Fullerton – where she also received her teaching credential – and received her Masters in Educational Administration from UCI. She has also completed four years of doctoral work at UCI, work that she was impelled to stop in order to take care of her mother, who was in failing health.

While Anita's life has clearly been one of great, and varied, achievement, her New Hope experience has become the bedrock of her deeper life. "It is difficult to describe how important New Hope has become for us," Anita offers. "I have never quite experienced the depth of care, and community, that I find in our church. C.J. feels exactly the same way. And my choir? There is nothing, other than my family, that provides me with greater joy than singing for God!"

Health Corner

Diabetes - Beware, and Be Aware

piabetes is a metabolic condition that causes high blood sugar in people either because their insulin production is inadequate, or because the body doesn't respond to insulin, or both. Insulin is produced by the pancreas. Fully 18.7% of all African Americans who are 20 years old or older have diagnosed, or undiagnosed, diabetes. The rate of diabetes in African Americans is 77% higher than in Caucasian people.

Common symptoms of diabetes include the following: frequent urination, increased thirst, increased hunger, weight gain, fatigue, the presence of cuts and bruises that don't heal, male sexual dysfunction, and numbness and tingling in the hands and feet. If you experience one or more of these symptoms, see your doctor and have your blood sugar levels checked.

The catalogue of health problems caused by diabetes is large, and includes increased eye disease (50% higher in blacks than whites), kidney disease, heart disease, and nerve damage. The good news is that your blood sugar can be significantly reduced through diet and exercise, two methods which often form the first line of treatment for diabetes. As merely one example: if you drink one sugar soda each day, your risk of developing diabetes is increased by 20%.

Control your diet, exercise more, and regularly have your blood sugar checked by your doctor.




